2. Contamination to the farming land with the dust from the mine / grain that can't be sold as the grain is contaminated with the dust.
3. Contamination to the house holders with dust in the rain water tanks and the home.
 - . Any illness occurred to families that live nearby.
 - . With food security growing each day if you take 9,000 acres or more prime agriculture land out of production that will only make things worse.

We are meant to be saving our environment for our future children to enjoy, not ruin it for them with mines, when this land has lost its production it will be hard or impossible to rehabilitate again.
